Course Description: This course provides students with an overview of physical and cultural geography. Students will learn the inner relationships between peoples, cultures, and their environment. The course will include a study of major land areas of the world: Africa, Asia, South America, Australia, Oceania, North America, and Europe. Students will develop study skills, including map reading, map analysis, critical thinking, and research skills.
